## Resources

In order to prepare for next year's AP Latin syllabus, students have required readings in English over the summer. Each student should obtain a copy of *Vergil's Aeneid: Hero, War, Humanity* by G.B. Cobbold and of *Caesar: Selections from his Commentarii De Bello Gallico* by Hans-Friedrich Mueller from Mrs. Sheffield before the end of the school year. These textbooks will be used throughout the school year.

AP Latin is equivalent to a junior-level college course. It is fast-paced and involves you using the knowledge of Latin vocabulary, grammar, and syntax that you've built up over the past three years to read, translate, and analyze original Latin texts written by Vergil and Caesar.
